### **SCHOOL PROFILE: Executive Summary**

This section of the school improvement plan is devoted to an overview of the characteristics of the school and its clientele. First and foremost is student data -- performance and demographic. Also included are community demographics, school characteristics, and our stakeholders' perspective.

#### **Student Performance Data**

In the spring of 2004, Bearfield Primary School became a Reading First School. We were chosen to apply for this grant based on NC ABC EOG data gathered over a three year period. Our students fell below the state average in reading. Our Literacy Specialist has designed and implemented guided reading programs, BEARS and CUBS for grade K-3. With Reading First, BEARS, CUBS, and Reading Recovery, our reading scores have increased each year. In 2006-2007, students scoring levels 3 and 4 were: Kindergarten, 82%; First grade, 86%; and Second grade, 92%. 06-07 Performance data show 74.7 % performed at or above level III in reading and 47.3 % in math. Our focus continues to be to raise our reading scores and to teach math using a different approach where the Weekly Math Essentials and Math Indicators serve as the basis for math instruction and Saxon Math as the supplemental program. Third grade will enhance their teaching using Scott Foresman textbooks as well. Writing is another focus as we are responsible for teaching the writing process in a sequential manner to prepare the students to take the fourth grade writing test.

#### **Student Demographic Data**

Bearfield Primary School's student population is about 74% black, 22% white and 4% other. Over the past two years, economically disadvantaged students make up about 71-77% of our student population. Many of the students live in single parent family dwellings. Most of the student population ride school buses to school from apartments, mobile homes, public housing, and single parent dwellings.

#### **Community Demographic Data**

Bearfield Primary School joined the community in the fall of 2000. Bearfield is located beside ViQuest and Hertford County High School. Our community is represented by children living in Winton, Aulander, Harrellsville, Ahoskie and other rural community townships. In the summer of 2007, a new teacher housing complex, Hertford Pointe was built adding a beautiful place for staff in the county to live. Ahoskie 's Recreation Department provides children and adults to participate in the sport of baseball with two adjacent fields where many nights are filled with the sounds of people cheering their team to victory.

#### **School Characteristics**

Bearfield Primary School is comprised of a staff of 138 people. There are 7 Pre-Kindergarten, 9 Kindergarten, 10 first grade, 9 second grade, and 9 third grade classes. Art, music, media, computer lab and physical education classes are offered weekly to K-3. Our Pre-Kindergarten program received Star Licensure with a five star rating. K-3 staff and students are in the fourth year of implementation of Reading First. We have 2 Guidance counselors, 3 Reading Recovery teachers, an AIG teacher, an ESL teacher, two Speech teachers, a Literacy specialist, 2 Reading First coaches, and an Instructional specialist/ testing coordinator. Bearfield Primary School is a Comer school believing that when children are developing well, the learn well. Three teams help to guide the students as they take a journey down the learning path of success. The three teams are: SPMT, School Planning and Management Team; SSST, Students, Staff, Support Team, and PT, Parent Team. Once you step inside the school, you feel the sincere love and passion of our staff.

Bearfield Primary School staff believe that we are making a difference, together. We share bus drivers with Ahoskie Elementary School and Hertford County High School with eleven of the best drivers based here at Bearfield. Our eight cafeteria staff are known around the county as the best cooks. They provide nutritious meals daily and they share the belief that children who eat well, learn better. Weekly fresh fruits and vegetables are provided weekly with hopes to instill good and healthy eating habits to all.
