SCHOOL PROFILE: Executive Summary

Riverview Elementary School 2007-2008

This section of the school improvement plan is devoted to an overview of the characteristics of the school and its clientele. First and foremost is student data -- performance and demographic. Also included are community demographics, school characteristics, and our stakeholders' perspective.

Student Performance Data

For the school year 2001-2002 students at Riverview Elementary were designated Low Performing, earning a composite score of 54.7% on EOG scores. The following school year, 2002-2003, with the assistance of a State Team our school became a School of Progress. We did not sustain that status and was designated as low performing for the 2003-2004 and 2004-2005 school year. We had a HELP Team during those years and for the 2005-2006 school year made Expected Growth at 56.9%. Our leadership changed for the 2006-2007 school year. Best practices strategies, rigor and relevant planning/teaching and data driven instruction and assistance from UVA were implemented to help us maintain momentum. Unfortunately, we did not make AYP. Our performance composite for the 2006-2007 school year was 54.3.

Student Demographic Data

The total enrollment for the 2007-2008 school year is 535. The ethnic composition consist of 78% black, 0.007% American Indian, 1.2% Asian, 0.007% Hispanics 0.032, .0.079% Caucasian, and 0.030% Multi-Racial. Most of our students, 76.2% qualify for the free/reduced lunch program.

Community Demographic Data

Riverview Elementary School students are residents of a rural county with a population of 22,601 as of the 2000 census. Hertford County is the largest county by population in the Roanoke Chowan area of Bertie, Gates, Northampton and Hertford counties. The average annual wage of the county is \$20,391 compared to \$29,321 in North Carolina. Over fifty percent of the county's population has not attained a college degree. Hertford County is one of

the poorest counties in North Carolina.

School Characteristics

Riverview Elementary School has been the base for many families in the Murfreesboro area. Founded by reverend Rouson, he and his wife Leuvenia started the first Kindergarten for Blacks in this area. The staff continues to impart the atmosphere of love and caring that was important to the founder.

We operated as a PreK-5 school until the 2004-2005 when 6th grade was added to the elementary schools in the district. The addition of 4 classrooms, new cafeteria and an auditorium was necessary for the expansion.

Stakeholder Perspective on the Quality of Education

The parents and community feel that Riverview Elementary School provides a good foundation for the students in their care. They are supportive of the many programs in school and community that focus on student achievement.
